

Appendix B

Non-Designated Local Protection Sites

As part of the consultation process it became very apparent that the heritage and character of the area was important for people to protect and maintain for future generations. There are listed buildings and even a historical listed monument. These sites are already protected under law; however, there are sites of both built and non-built heritage that the residents wanted to see protected.

While individual buildings have been listed so have small neighbourhoods whose impact could easily be damaged by misaligned development thus affecting the entire areas aesthetic. These sites are not limited to buildings but included sites of ecological importance to the community or features that are pivotal in making Sowerby the Township it is today.

Below is a list of sites/ features that will be protected under SNPP11.
